Presentation	Ampoules: 100 microg/2mL			
	Ampoules: 500 microg/10mL			
	Bags: Fentanyl 2000microg/100mL (20microg/mL) in Sodium Chloride 0.9% (Baxter®) (100mL)			
	Bags: Fentanyl 2.5 microg/mL with Bupivacaine 0.0625% Infusion (KEMH®)			
	Syringe: Fentanyl 20microg/2mL in Sodium Chloride 0.9% (Baxter®)			
Storage	Store at room temperature, below 25°C			
_	Protect from light

Dose	Refer to relevant KEMH Clinical Guidelines for appropriate dose regimes (links below)			
Administration	IV infusion			
	Preferred route. Use Baxter® 2000microg/100mL pre-filled bags where available			
	Step 1 Dilution: Dilute 500 microg of Fentanyl with 90 mL of sodium chloride 0.9% or glucose 5% (Total volume should be 100mL)			
	This makes 5microg/mL concentration			
	Administration: Suitable as a continuous infusion or in patient-controlled analgesia (PCA)

	IV injection			
	Inject undiluted over 3 to 5 minutes.			
	May be diluted with sodium chloride 0.9% to facilitate slow injection			

	Willow for infants and abildren				
	IV Use for infants and children Inject undiluted over 3 to 5 minutes, or dilute with sodium chloride 0.9% or glucose 5% and give by continuous infusion.				
	Subcut injection Suitable in palliative care patients				
	IM Injection Suitable but not the preferred route. Injection is painful and absorption is variable.				
Pregnancy	1 st Trimester: Considered safe				
,	2 nd Trimester: Considered safe				
	3 rd Trimester: Considered safe				
Breastfeeding	Considered safe				
Monitoring	Monitor sedation score and respiratory rate
