## HIGH RISK Medication



Presentation	Tablet: 250mg					
	Tablet (Modified Release): 450mg					
	Oral Liquid (as citrate): 250mg/50mL					
Storage	Store at room temperature, below 25°C					
Dose	Prevention of manic or depressive episodes in bipolar disorder:					
	Oral:					
	250mg to1000mg daily in divided doses*#					
	Treatment of acute mania:					
	Oral:					
	Initially 750mg to 1000mg daily in divided dose, increase dose by 250mg to 500mg daily if necessary*#					
	*Adjust according to serum concentration					
	*every 12 hours if using modified release tablets					
Administration	<u>Oral</u>					
	Tablet (Immediate Release): Take with food					
	<b>Tablet (Modified Release):</b> Do not break, crush or chew, and avoid taking with hot drinks					
	Maintain a normal diet with regular salt and fluid intake					
	Co-administration with sodium bicarbonate containing products (e.g. Ural®, Citravescent®) makes lithium less effective					
	<ul> <li>Lithium interacts with a number of medications including NSAIDs, increasing risk of lithium toxicity. Consult your ward pharmacist.</li> </ul>

Monitoring	Routine monitoring include: full blood picture, renal function, thyroid function, serum electrolytes, and serum calcium.
