Antimicrobial Restriction – Unrestricted

Presentation	Capsule: 50mg			
	Capsule: 100mg			
Dose	Asymptomatic bacteriuria			
	Oral:			
	100mg 12 hourly for 5 days			
	Acute cystitis			
	Oral:			
	100mg 12 hourly for 5 – 7 days (may be extended if slow response of a recurrent episode)			
	Prophylaxis post pyelonephritis			
	Oral:			
	50-100mg at night			
Administration	Oral:			
	Take with food or milk to reduce nausea and to improve absorption			
Pregnancy	1 st Trimester: Safe to use Avoid in last 4 weeks of pregnancy			
	2nd Trimester: Safe to use due to increased risk of jaundice and haemolytic anaemia in G6PD			
	3 rd Trimester: Monitoring required deficient mother and fetus			
Breastfeeding	Considered safe to use			
Monitoring	May cause drowsiness or dizziness			
	Monitor for difficulty breathing, development of cough or numbness and tingling			
	May turn urine a brownish colour
