Quick Links Pregnancy and Administration Monitoring Dose Breastfeeding **Restrictions** Formulary: Restricted (Granules) Formulary: Unrestricted (Tablets and Vials) **Medication Class** Proton pump inhibitor Presentation **Tablet:** 20mg & 40mg Granules: 40mg per sachet Vial: 40mg Storage Tablet: Store at room temperature, below 25°C. Granules: Store at room temperature, below 25°C. Vial: Store at room temperature, below 25°C. Protect from light. Once reconstituted, can be stored at 2 to 8°C for 12 hours or 25°C for 24 hours. Dose

Peptic Ulcer Disease (PUD) or Gastric Oesophageal Reflux Disease (GORD)

IV/Oral:

40mg once daily

Prevention of NSAID-associated dyspepsia

Oral:

20mg once daily

Helicobacter Pylori eradication

Oral:

40mg twice daily (with two antibacterial agents)

Emergency Caesarean Section (when famotidine iv is not available)

IV:

40mg without delay, once decision made for ECS

Administration

Refer to the Australian Injectable Drugs Handbook

<u>Oral</u>

Swallow tablet whole, do not crush or chew. For symptom control, tablet is best taken half an hour before most troublesome meal.

Pregnancy

1st Trimester: Consider alternative

2nd Trimester: Consider alternative

3rd Trimester: Consider alternation
