Participate in the Australian Childbirth-related Trauma Screening Study

As a woman who has given birth at King Edward Memorial Hospital, you are eligible to participate in this important childbirth trauma research.

The study aims to help support future women, babies, and families by improving birth trauma screening.

What is involved in the study

If you would like to participate, there are two phases that you may be asked to complete. The first will take place today **or within seven days of your birth**, and the second part will be in three to six months.

1. The first phase will take **2 to 5 minutes** where we will ask you some questions about yourself and the birth of your most recent baby. It will cover the birth until your baby is one week old.
2. The second phase will involve an online questionnaire that will be sent to you when you baby is around 3 to 6 months and takes around **ten minutes** to complete. You may also be invited to participate in a phone interview to further assess any birth trauma.
